School Streets

It has come to my attention that *St Paul's Primary School*, located at the end of Bromsgrove Street, will become a *designated School Street*. My understanding is that this will happen *from September*. School Streets are areas around school entrances that are closed to vehicles during peak drop-off and pick-up times. This helps keep children safe, promotes active travel and reduces air pollution.

School Streets means that you will need a permit to enter the streets - highlighted on the map below - between 8.30-9.15am and 2.30-3.15pm on school days. Fines will be issued if you do not have a permit.


You do not need permits for the streets around Grangetown Primary, but the Council will be monitoring parking in the area - so there's never been a better time to switch to walking, riding or scooting to school.

I have asked the Council for more information, they advise that information has been sent to streets affected. They will also be keeping an eye on traffic around our school from September – so make sure you walk, bike, scoot, if possible.

If you must use the car – arrive with time to park safely and legally.

Eco-committee has noticed lots of single-use plastic bottles littering our playground.

Eco Committee would like all children and staff to bring reusable water bottles to school instead of bringing a new bottle every day because:

We think that it is important to help our world and to be 'responsible consumers'.

Did you know, it is cheaper to buy a reusable bottle.

If you buy a fruit shoot drink from ASDA: each drink costs 32p

If you have a new bottle every school day for a month: 20 bottles \times 32p = £6.20

A reusable bottle from Asda costs £2.50. or cheaper!

There will be less waste because you can re-use it over and over again!

We spoke to Mrs Chase and she has agreed that we can ban these bottles from the playground. So, from now on, only reusable bottles can be taken outside.

Who can have a grant?

- Chidren in Rec Year 6. This is £125.
- Children starting Secondary School. This is £200.
- Children attending special school, a special needs resource base or a pupil referral unit, and are aged 4 to
- All looked after children of compulsory school age based in a Cardiff school.
- Pupils with no recourse to public funds and asylum seekers entering any primary age year group; Year 7; Year 8; Year 9; Year 10 and Year 11 in the 2023 to 2024 school year.

What's it for?

The Grant is for families on a low income to buy school uniform, sports kit, uniform for enrichment activities, school bags, stationery etc. Please note IT equipment is excluded from this grant.

How do parents qualify?

The parent or guardian making the application must be receiving one of the following:

- Income Support
- Job Seekers Allowance (income based)
- Employment Support Allowance (income related)
- Child Tax Credit, with a household income of £16,190 or less
- Pension Credit (guarantee element)
- Universal Credit with net household earnings of less than £740

Working Tax Credit is not a qualifying Benefit and if you are in receipt of Working Tax Credit you will not be entitled to a Uniform Grant even if you get this together with one of the incomes above.

If you meet these criteria, you need to complete the School Essentials Grant application form.

Need help? Call into school at 3pm and ask for Mrs Lalik; she will help you fill in the form.
